

100% At Mt. Holly Give Day's Pay

In generous and unselfish support of the 1966 greater Mount Holly United Appeal, 100 per cent of the employees at Mount Holly Spinning Mill pledged a day's pay or more in the recent campaign. Mount Holly became the first Fieldcrest plant ever to attain the 100 per cent Fair Share mark in a United fund campaign.
