Fieldcrest Big Factor In Local Economy

Fieldcrest Mills paid out more than \$\sigma_5\$-million in the Tri-City area in 1965 in payrolls, for city and county taxes and for new machinery, equipment and buildings in Leaksville-Spray-Draper.

The company's payrolls in Leaksville Township in 1965 were \$20,547,217, an increase of 16 per cent over 1964. Total employment in the company's plants in Leaksville, Spray and Draper at the end of 1965 was 4,351, an increase of 315 people or a 7.8 per cent increase over the previous year.

Fieldcrest paid city taxes in Leaks-lile, Spray and Draper amounting to \$265,007, an increase of \$64,727, or a 32 per cent increase over 1964. The company's Rockingham County taxes were \$22,045, an increase of \$27,408, or a 4 per cent increase over the previous year. Total property and personal property taxes paid in Rockingham County, including city and county taxes, were \$487,052, an increase over 1964 of \$92,-135 or 23.3 per cent.

Total cash payments for new machinery, equipment and buildings in the hi-City area for 1965 were \$4,636,000, making a total of \$22,961,000 in capital expenditures by the company in the Tri-

Cities since October 1, 1953, when Fieldcrest Mills, Inc. was organized.

Fieldcrest paid close to \$1,000,000 in Social Security taxes and payroll taxes for unemployment insurance for Tri-City employees. By law, the company pays half and the employee half of Social Security taxes and the company pays 100 per cent of the taxes to provide state-administered compensation for eligible employees when out of work.

In addition, a substantial sum was distributed in 1965 in the form of pensions for the company's retired employees, a majority of whom are residents of the Tri-City area.

Most of the over \$25-million pumped into the local economy by Fieldcrest operations was in direct payments. Additional large sums were spent on fringe benefits for the 4,351 Tri-City employees and their dependents. Also to be added are the expenditures made for purchases of goods and services from local firms.

The figures do not include the money paid out at any manufacturing locations other than the Tri-Cities or for sales personnel. Expenditures for raw materials also are excluded.
