## Tri-City Construction Projects Completed

Construction of the new Sheet Finishing Mill on the former Union Carbide property near Draper has been virtually completed. Other contractors are rapidly completing their work on the electrical, air conditioning, and sprinkler systems.

The fences have been completed, the parking lot paved, and the road from the plant to the company's property line paved. It is expected that the machinery will be moved into the new quarters by the end of March.

Built at a cost of \$1,500,000, the modern air-conditioned Sheet Finishing Mill will house the sheet sewing and warehousing operation now located in the Nantucket Building at Spray.

In another building project in the Tri-City area, construction has been completed on the addition to the Karastan Building at Spray.

## 165 Employees Give Blood At Bloodmobile

Fieldcrest Mills employees gave outstanding support to the visit of the Bloodmobile to the Leaksville Moose Hall February 10. Fieldcresters gave 165 of the 255 pints donated, amounting to 65 per cent of the total.

The donors were from practically every mill, plus the General Offices, Specials Department, Research and Development Department and the Fieldcrest Store.

The Karastan Mill led with 85 donors, and the Bedsread Mill was second with 35. The General Offices furnished nine donors and the Specials Department, seven.

The Bleachery had five donors and the Sheeting Mill, Sheet Finishing Mill, Research and Development and Fieldcrest Store had four each. The Blanket Mill and Central Warehouse furnished three donors each and the Finishing Mill furnished two.

Among the over-all 255 donors, 86 were first-time donors and 130 gave blood as replacements. A total of 287 persons presented themselves to donate.
