System Starts May 1

The Tax Adjustment Act of 1966 provides for a new system of graduated federal income tax withholding which employers are required to apply to all wages and salaries received by employees on or after May 1.

This is not a tax increase but is a new system to make withholding come closer to the actual tax. It will relieve many taxpayers of the problem of having to pay large amounts with their annual income tax returns. Also, it will re-duce over-withholding for many other taxpayers.

The amount of tax withheld from wages now depends on whether the employee is single or married as well as the number of exemptions claimed on Form W-4. Married persons must file a new Form W-4 to obtain correct withholding under the new system.

All employees will receive a new W-4 form prior to May 1. This form should be completed promptly and returned to the departmental supervisor, who will forward it to the Payroll Dept.

Fieldcrest Mills is requesting all employes to sign a new certificate even if they are single. This is being done in order to give all employees an opportunity to make any corrections necessary and have a correct W-4 form on file as of May 1.
