

Officers of Dan River Mills, Incorporated and Fieldcrest Mills, Inc. told members of Fieldcrest management at a meeting May 16 in the Morehead High School auditorium that when the proposed merger of the two companies becomes final, Fieldcrest will become the largest division of the new company.

Robert S. Small, president and chief executive officer of Dan River, would continue in the same capacity with the new company, Dan River-Fieldcrest.

In discussing operational plans for Fieldcrest, Mr. Small said that it would be operated as a fully staffed, semi-autonomous division with its own staff services and sales groups.

3,000 Persons Tour New Finishing Plants

Approximately 3,000 persons, including employees, townspeople and visitors from nearby cities, toured the new Sheet and Bedspread Finishing Mills at a recent open house program.

Those attending the open house were able to see the cutting, sewing, packaging, warehousing, shipping and customer service operations for sheets and bedspreads. In addition, the Data Processing section was open for inspection.

The Sheet Finishing mill, built at a cost of \$1,500,000, contains 175,000 square feet of space. The adjoining Bedspread Finishing mill is similar in design but larger than the Sheet Finishing mill, having 210,000 square feet.

The modern, air conditioned plants are situated in the middle of a 70-acre site that was cleared on the former Union Carbide property near Draper.
