Outstanding Record

Employees of the Karastan Mill completed an outstanding safety record of 2,906,807 man-hours without a lost-time accident from September 16, 1965, through May 30, 1967, amounting to an average of 4,071 hours per employee.

Although the plant's record was broken when an accident occurred on June 3, 1967, the Karastan Mill earlier had received the Award of Honor, the highest award given by the National Safety Council. The Award of Honor was earned by working two million man-hours without a disabling injury.
