Credit Union To Pay Another 5% Dividend

Members of the Fieldcrest Mills Credit Union in all locations will receive a per cent per annum dividend, figured on their average monthly balances and credited to each member's share account as of December 31, 1969.

The dividend was raised to 5 per cent as of January 1, 1968. The Credit Union has never paid less than 4 per cent per annum on savings. The first increase was from 4 per cent to 4½ per cent effective January 1, 1965. The rate was increased to 4½ per cent June 30, 1966.
