Four Employees Have Continuous Service Totaling 170 Years

The four persons shown above have combined continuous service with the company totaling 170 years. Each has celebrated a 45th or 40th work anniversary in the past two weeks and two of them began their continuous service on the same day 40 years age.

Mamie Frances Jenkins was employed May 12, 1925, and has never been off the payroll for any reason in the 45 years since that time. She worked as a roving marker in the Carding Department at the Sheeting Mill until she became a battery filler in the Sheeting Weave Room in 1939. She has been a

sweeper in the same department since 1966. She is a native of Surry County.

Bunyon Lee Thompson, of the Bedspread Mill, completed 45 years of continuous service May 25. A native of Franklin County, Va., he was first employed at the Nantucket Mill and later worked at the Rhode Island Mill. He became a shuttle filler at the Rayon Mill in 1939 and worked on that job until he entered military service in World War II.

Upon his return from service he resumed his old job but shortly afterward became a weaver. He was a loom

fixer from 1952 until about the time the Rayon Mill closed. He has been a loom fixer at the Bedspread Mill since that time.

Buster Blackwell was employed in the Sheeting Mill Carding Department May 19, 1930, and has never been off of the payroll. He began as a doffer, was a card hand for several years and from 1947 until 1954 was a card grinder. He was promoted to assistant foreman in 1954 and continues to serve in that capacity. Mr. Blackwell is a native of the Draper section of Eden.

Daniel Webster Overby has continuous service at the Blanket Mill since May 19, 1930. He had worked as early as 1923 although his service was not continuous. He has been in the Weave Room the entire time, working as a weaver until 1939 and from 1939 to the present as a loom fixer. He also is a Draper native.
