

## Two Plants To Get Barbecue Dinners

Two Eden plants have earned safety award barbecues under terms of the Fieldcrest Mills safety contest. In the company-wide contest, the employees of any mill working an average of 2,000 hours per employee are given a free barbecue dinner.

Attaining the 2,000 man-hour goal without a disabling injury were the Blanket Finishing Mill and the Draper Sheeting Mill. The barbecue for the Blanket Finishing employees has been scheduled for Wednesday, September 16. The date of the Sheeting Mill barbecue is to be announced when arrangements have been completed.

The Blanket Finishing Mill had accumulated 913,478 accident-free man-hours through the week ending August 30, an average of 2,086 per employee. The last disabling injury occurred May 19, 1969.

The Sheeting Mill has operated since July 22, 1969, without a lost-time accident. During this period the mill accumulated a total of 907,179 safe man-hours, an average of 2,000 hours per employee, through the week ending September 6.

## Annual Rose Show To Be Held September 26 At Fieldcrest Store

## Luncheon Honors Fieldcrest Scholars

The management of Fieldcrest Mills, Inc., gave a luncheon at Meadow Greens Country Club August 27 in honor of the Fieldcrest Scholars—the sons and daughters of employees who have received scholarships given by the Fieldcrest Foundation.

Attending the luncheon with the scholarship recipients were G. William Moore, president and chairman, other officers of the Company, and Clyde Pressley, administrative assistant, Leaksville Township Public Schools. Mr. Pressley represented John M. Hough, schools superintendent, a member of the Fieldcrest Scholarship committee.

Mr. Moore made a brief talk in which he gave the background of the scholarship program in which 51 scholarships have been awarded since 1960. Many of the Fieldcrest Scholars have made outstanding records in college and in their later careers, he said.

## Dividend Announced

Directors of Fieldcrest Mills, Inc. August 25 declared a quarterly dividend of \$.35 per share payable September 25 to holders of record September 11. This dividend is the same amount as was paid for each quarter of 1969.
