Changes Announced In Blanket Operation

The following organization changes have been announced in the Blanket Operation at Eden:

Paul E. Jones, foreman of Wool Picking and Carding, was appointed foreman of the Non-Woven Mill, replacing David J. Youngblood who resigned.

Donald R. Johnson, supervisor of the Blanket Mill Laboratory, was named foreman of Wool Picking and Carding, replacing Mr. Jones.

Barry N. Strong, formerly assistant foreman in the Cotton Carding and Spinning Departments, assumed responsibility as foreman of the Flock Blanket Mill.

Mr. Jones has been with Fieldcrest most of the time since 1942 except for his service in the Navy during World War II. He worked on various production jobs, mainly in the Wool Carding Department.

He served as assistant foreman of the Wool Picking and Wool Carding Departments and as foreman of the Non-Woven Mill. He had been foreman of Wool Picking and Carding since March, 1969.

Mr. Johnson was first employed in 1961 as a management trainee at the Karastan Spinning Mill in Greenville. He was an assistant foreman in the Spinning Department and the Carding Department and later was foreman of the Carding Department.

He was transferred to the Blanket Mill in 1967 as an assistant foreman of Wool Picking and later was an assistant foreman in Wool Carding. He had been laboratory supervisor since April, 1969. He is a veteran of the Air Force and attended East Carolina University, majoring in industrial arts.

Mr. Strong joined Fieldcrest in September, 1969, as a management trainee at the Blanket Mill and worked on various training assignments. He was appointed an assistant foreman in Cotton Carding and Spinning Departments in April, 1970. A graduate of Murray State University with a B.S. degree in industrial arts, he served the Navy for six years and was discharged with the rank of lieutenant.
