

Bedsread Mill Campaigns Against Hand Injuries

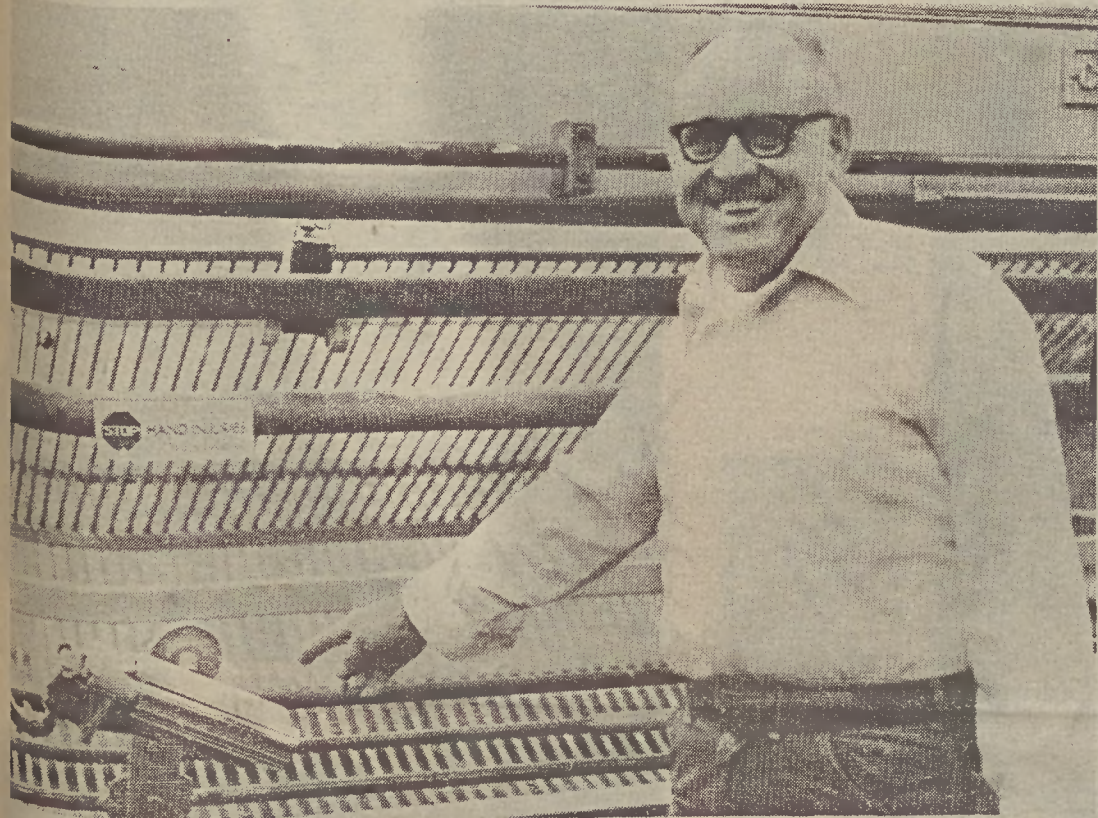
The Bedsread Mill will have as its safety program for January, a full-scale campaign against hand injuries. During 1976, 43 percent of the recordable injuries at the Bedsread Mill were hand injuries.

The campaign, designed to bring the problem to the attention of employees, will

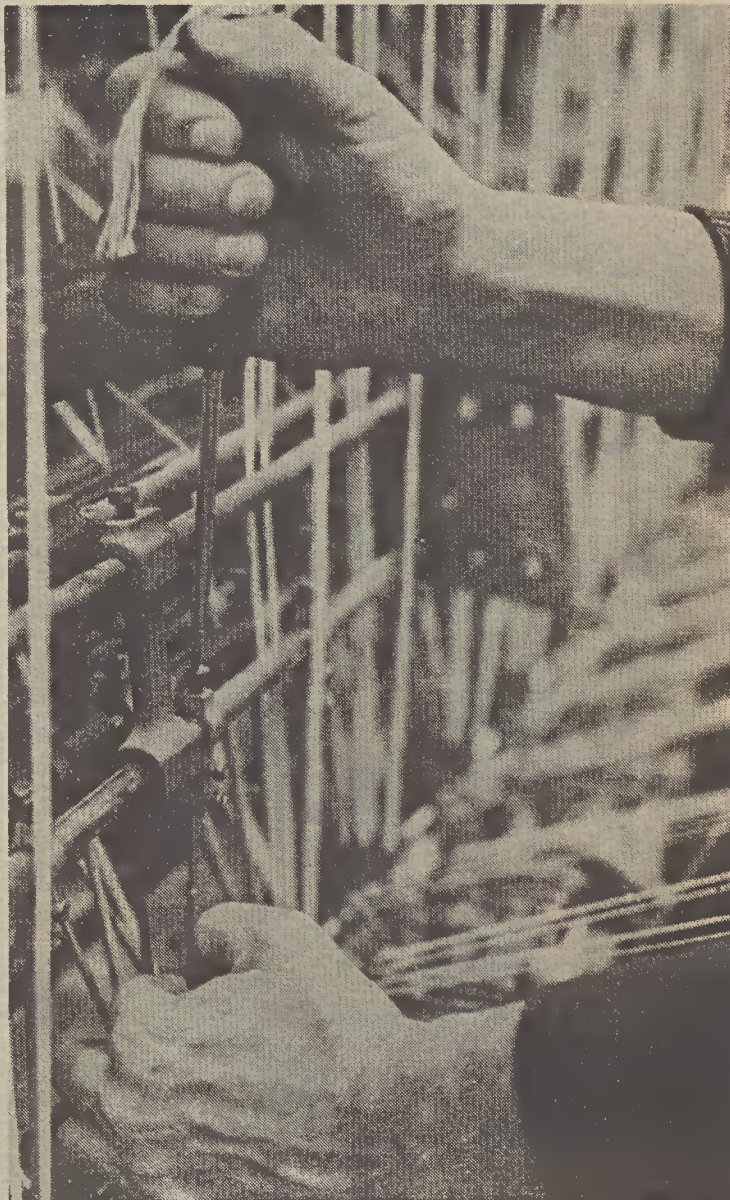
feature posters showing situations which can lead to hand injuries. Also emphasized will be various methods to avoid such injuries; stickers carrying the slogan, "Stop Hand Injuries", which will be displayed at locations where hand injuries are likely to occur; and safety tips from supervisors en-

couraging employees to be aware of hand injuries and make an effort to avoid them.

At the January meetings, employees will be encouraged to submit some of their ideas on how to stop hand injuries.
