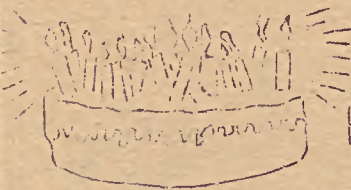




NEW BOOK REVIEW
