This Orchestra began with a two fold aim—to provide superior concerts for patrons and to serve the whole community through so-called "popular" performance. This was achieved under the leadership of Conductor Sokoloff until 1933.

The Orchestra is supported by hundreds of annual subscribers to the maintenance fund. With surplus money, they visit and give programs in public schools. But they have not stopped at this, they have gradually pushed their way into all great American headlights. The orchestra is now under the leadership of Conductor George Szell.
