

CHORUS ON TOUR

The Montreat College Chorus, under the direction of Mr. Allan Guy, has completed plans for the first of the two choir tours to be made in the near future.

The Chorus will leave Montreat on Friday, February 19, and go to High Point, North Carolina. On Sunday morning, they will sing at the First Presbyterian Church in Burlington, North Carolina, and Sunday evening they will go to Danville, Virginia, singing at the First Presbyterian Church's Vesper service. On Monday they will sing at the high school in Leaksville, Virginia, returning to Montreat Monday night.

The plans for the Chorus' second tour are not yet complete. This tour will begin on February 26. The First Presbyterian Church, Chattanooga, Tennessee; Look-out Mountain Presbyterian Church, Look-out Mountain, Tennessee; and First Presbyterian Church, Dalton, Georgia, are some of the places at which the Chorus will sing on this second tour. They plan to return to Montreat on March 2.
