During the week of April 7-11, designated by Cabinet as the week of elections, the campus leaders for next year emerged. Due to the fact that the college is being converted to a junior status, these officers were elected from the present freshman class and will not actually take office until September. They will work for the remainder of the year as "trainees" to those who are currently holding the positions.

Glenn Camp, a 20-year-old Hendersonville resident, was elected president of the Student Government Association. He has served as freshman class president this year and has therefore had experience on Cabinet. He is the first male student to hold this office at Montreat College.

In the Hendersonville-Asheville area, Glenn has sung with the Gospelettes Quartet on his family's radio program. He is a member of the Bethel Baptist Church. His major field of study is mathematics.
