

## THE HISTORICAL FOUNDATION

The Historical Foundation, owned and operated by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, is an educational and religious institution formulated to preserve, assimilate, and promote the use of materials pertaining to the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches of the world.

It was established in 1926, and incorporated under the laws of North Carolina in the following year. The Foundation has a wealth of information and is recognized today as one of the world's greatest collection of Presbyterian and Reformed literature. It is further shown to be an outstanding institution by the fact that it has been visited and utilized by more than 40 different universities and graduate schools for the preparation of academic dissertations and research.

More than 37,000 volumes, 25,000 pamphlets, 15,000 pictures, and 1,000 volumes of manuscripts of the history of churches and women's work in the Presbyterian Church in the United States can be found. Topics range from "The mission of the Church in China," to "The Huguenots in France," and "Slavery and Schism." The two most popular topics, however, are local and family history.

In addition to the regular and routine work of the Foundation, synod and Presbytery records have been microfilmed. More than 200 rolls of films are on file. By far, the greatest amount of work is through correspondence. **The Historical Foundation News** has been published for the last 20 years and is distributed on a quarterly basis.

The Foundation is considered a vital and integral part of the church mission today. It is both a fascinating and interesting place, and visits are encouraged by students.

## WITH OUR CAGERS

Seven returning lettermen are back from last year's squad that posted a dismal 4-14 won-lost record. In many of the games the Cavaliers lost by very slim margins due to the team's lack of depth and height. However, this season they have both, which should give Montreat a more respectable record.

Heading the lettermen will be Dan Rabon, the leading scorer, who averaged 20 points a game last season. Also back, for one semester, is the team's second leading scorer, Mike Clark, who averaged 14.7 points per game. Don Patrick averaged close to 10 points and 12 rebounds a game.

Mike Manos, who along with Rabon was elected co-captain, will man one of the guard spots. Steve Moody, who saw a great deal of action last year, will be pressing Manos and Clark for a starting position.

David Peele and Johnny Woody will also give added strength to the returning sophomores and a host of promising freshmen will provide the depth that the cagers lacked in the 1965-1966 season.

Ross Younts, selected to the all-city team in Miami, Florida, will be a starting forward. Behind him will be Dayton Jackson and Frank Byrn. Bob Templeton and Clayton Bright are expected to play a lot in the forward positions.

Montreat will be playing basically the same schedule as last year. Dropped is Gardner-Webb which was ranked in the top 20 junior colleges last year, and has been rated in the top 10 this year.

When asked to compare last year's team with the new cagers Coach Wilson stated, "This year's squad has a little more height, but the height is inexperienced and it will probably take several games before we realize our potential. The biggest advantage we have will be that we can

substitute more than we did last season.

Rebounding hurt the team last year. "A few more rebounds should come our way," said Coach Wilson, "in that one of our freshmen, Ross Younts, is 6'3". Along with Clayton Bright 6'3", Bob Templeton 6'4", Don Patrick 6'2", and Dan Rabon 6'1" we should be stronger on the boards."

Coach Wilson went on to say, "Our strategy last year was to work for the good shot knowing we would not get many second or third tries because of our lack of height. The offense will be the same, although we expect to get more shots under the basket due to our increased height. Also, we plan to run more. We should win more games this season."

On Tuesday night, November 29th, the Cavaliers lost to the Owls of Warren Wilson by a score of 107-70. It was the first game of the season for Montreat while the Owls evened their record at 2-2.

The Cavaliers were in the game for the first five minutes and after that the Owls rolled to a 61-27 half-time lead. Bad passes and the inability of Rabon and Clark to score in the first half hurt Montreat. Don Patrick and Steve Moody scored for the cagers in the first 20 minutes.

Montreat stayed within three points of the Owls in the second half. Rabon made a fine record the second half, making 23 points, high scorer of the game.

The Cavaliers lost their second game of the year to King's College, on December 3, 69-57. Grabbing a quick 7-3 lead Montreat looked as though they were on their way to their first win. About midway through the half the Cavaliers lost steam and King's went ahead to stay. King's led at the half 37-25.

Beginning the final half, King's began to increase their lead. At one point King's had an 18 point lead over the cagers, sparking the Cavaliers back into action. Ross Younts hit three quick field goals. Dan Rabon and Mike Clark popped in two shots each, with Don Patrick and Mike Manos scoring on foul shots. The Cavaliers trailed by only five points with 4:24 left on the clock. King's then called time out and the momentum that Montreat had ended.
