Fellowship Hall Renovated

As the student body of Montreat enlarges, the school saw the need to expand the women's dormitories. The solution to this problem came in the purchase of Fellowship Hall from the Mountain Retreat Association., Plans to renovate Fellowship Hall have been in the making for a year. The work began in May of last year after graduation. Fellowship Hall was built in 1937

and is now undergoing repairs in electrical and plumbing fixtures. The interior is also being revised and carpeting and furniture are being provided for the building. The first and second floors of Fellowship Hall are to be finished by the end of December. The third floor of the structure will not be in use until the

funds for the project are available.


The reconstruction of Fellowship

Hall has cost approximately \$125,000 for the first and second floors and is estimated to cost \$150,000 for the work involved in the renovation of the third floor. This building is expected to hold 44 students and will be open to the public for summer conferences.

Also being discussed is the renovation of Howerton Hall.

Drawingshave not been furnished as of this writing, but this project is estimated to cost \$250,000. Ideas are being discussed now for this plan and construction will begin in the summer if the necessary funds are made available.

These buildings when completed are to resemble Davis and MA Hall in quality and character.
