Montreat Road to be paved within 60 days

What seemed like 1000 years of road purgatory is going to end soon - 60 days if it gets done on schedule. According to Chief Halford, the reason they tore Montreat Road up in the first place was to put in a new sewer system.

They wanted to let the summer pass before they paved over it. When they first put the sewer system in they had to compact it. The long waiting period was to make sure they wouldn't have to tear it back up if they missed a sewer or water tap.

They wanted to be certain that they got all of the house taps, culverts, and drains right before summer, because visitors use the houses on the side of the road, and tons of cars travel this road during the summer.

The town had to put bids out for paving the road. The Sewer District also had to pay for part of it. The town had to do renovations and put in culverts for rain water. They weren't finished because it's hard to pave during the summer as a result of all the cars.

Culverts are placed underground, perpendicular to the street. Whenever they dig the road up, there is usually patches where it's put back together.

A temporary binder was put down so cars could travel on the road. This is easy to remove in case of emergencies or changes. Chief Halford stated that the road would be totally paved and finished in 60 days, or the contractor, Banks Construction, would be penalized. He

said it should be as smooth as the interstates.

Two off-campus students commented about the road situation. Tamra Harris sighed, "Going here last year and this year messed up my shocks. It rattles. If they're gonna pave the road, I can be patient if they're gonna do it right and it'll be smooth."

Graham Hudson said, "I'm glad I'm driving a pick-up truck. It takes the road a lot better than a car does."
