ow E-mail Pranksters Duped Campus

The e-mail came from a Hotmail account under the name danstruble@hotmail.com at a time when many professors had scheduled midterms. Junior Adam Ripley and sophomore Andrew May masterminded the prank after previous days of heavy snow. The following interview takes an indepth look at the two perpetrators. Kortney: What gave you the idea?

On Wednesday, March 2, Adam Ripley: I had the idea last year. But I didn't have anybody to do it with, and I didn't want to do it by myself. A particular student had the idea this year and recommended doing it. I decided that I would do it. That particular student decided not to be involved because he was worried about the consequences. So I ended up doing it with Andrew May.

Andrew May: [Adam] and me and another buddy of mine were hanging out in my room about 12: 30 or so. And there was snow on the ground. The other friend said,

"You know what would be so easy to do?" And he presented the idea. But then he backed out. I was like, "yeah, let's do this. It's funny."

K: What went into planning it?

Adam: I had to figure out where to do it so that they couldn't track my Internet port. So, I decided to do it from [an off-campus student's] front porch at 2 in the morning. He was asleep in his house. It
