MEDICINE CHEST

What's the latest on bee-sting remedies? - M.P.
The best remedy for relief from bee-sting pain is aspirin and water, rubbed right onto the sting. An immediate soothing effect occurs from evaporative cooling, and inflammation is reduced from local absorption of aspirin at the sting site. For best results, rub a paste made from a crushed aspirin tablet and a little water directly on the sting.

Is there any chance that heroin will become a legal treatment for those with terminal illness? - J.M.

Possibly. A double-blind trial of heroin versus morphine was recently completed in 48 cancer patients who had moderate, severe pain. The patients rated heroin 2 1/2 times more potent than morphine when the secret code was broken at the end of the study. The doctors also noted that morphine and heroin had the same rate of addiction.

My son has epilepsy and has been taking medication for over five years. His doctor says that he can expect to stay on the medication for the rest of his life. Is there no alternative? - C.D.

A new study of 300,000 epileptic children suggests that youngsters who have been symptom free for the past four years while taking medication may safely discontinue anticonvulsant therapy.
