He wears on his breast bars representing five campaigns. He was in the campaigns against the Crow Indians in 1877 and in that against the Ute and Cheyenne Indians in 1879. He served in Porto Rico in the Spanish-American war and was in the Philippines from 1901 to 1903. He was with Pershing in Mexico in 1916.

Colonel Macomb was a member of the military court which tried the negro troops that engaged in the famous riot at Houston, Texas, when eleven of the principals were hanged and a number of others sentenced to life imprisonment.

Colonel Macomb's father was an army officer, Colonel John Macomb of the United States engineers. He is a descendant of John Livingston, signer of the declaration of independence. Colonel Macomb has three sons in the service, one in the navy and two in the army.
