H. P. H. S. IS ELIMINATED BY REIDSVILLE

SCORE OF 21-14

The local high school basketball team were eliminated from the state high school championship race Tuesday night when they were defeated by the crack Reidsville outfit by the score of 21-14. The game was played on the Greensboro Y. M. C. A. court and was one of the hardest fought basketball battles ever witnessed there.

Flicked by outsiders to win by a margin of from 20 to 30 points, the Reidsville aggregation had to put forth every ounce of energy that was in them to win at all.

The High Point team fought like Trojans throughout the entire contest. Although they were never in the lead, they were never more than two or three points behind. The Pointers played a defensive game that has seldom been surpassed by any high school quint in this section of the state. Miller, their crack captain and center, who has been caging nine and ten field goals in every game he played, was guarded so close that he was able to annex only three field baskets. Hedrick was detailed to guard him and he did a good job of it; very seldom letting the elongated center get away from him. Whenever Miller went, Hedrick was there to guard him.

The game opened with a rush, Captain Miller caging a field goal in the first few minutes of play. As he made the shot, Hedrick fouled him and he was therefore entitled to two free throws, both of which he made good. Ingram shot a long field goal and the score stood 4-2 in favor of Reidsville. Miller augmented it by tossing in two from the 15-foot mark. Ingram tied the score when he shot two pretty field goals in rapid succession but Reidsville forged ahead when Pettigrew and Nance each dropped in a field basket. Fuqua caged one from near the center of the court and Nance shot one from under the basket. Ingram tossed in his fourth field goal and Miller added another two points to his total. The half ended with the Reidsville team on top of a 16-10 score.

Pettigrew was banished from the game in the second quarter after making four personal fouls.

In the second half both quints played a great defensive game, Reidsville scoring only five points while the best the locals could do was to annex four.

The defensive playing of both teams was the outstanding feature of the contest. So close was the guarding that open shots were few and far between.
