> Raleigh, April 19.—Charles A. Jonas, of Lincolnton, denied a district attorneyship by the senate, today filed formal notice with the State Board of Election that he would be a candidate for Congress n the 10th district.

Jonas, who was re-elected as Republican national committeeman at Charlotte, it was reported, was offered his party's nomination for governor at Charlotte last week, but declined. He is without opposition so far in the primary as is his Democratic opponent, Major A L. Bulwinkle, now representing the new 10th (old ninth) district. Ir the 1928 turnover Jonas defeated Congressman Bulwinkle, and served one term, being defeated for re election in 1930.
