CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS.

The United States Civil Service Commission will accept applications until December 1 for positions of conservationists (forestry) of various grades, to fill vacancies under the Forest Service, Department of Agriculture. These new positions have been created by the emergency work approved by the Public Works Board as a part of the National Recovery Act program, and appointments may be only for the duration of such work.

A separate list of eligibles in each grade will be established for each of the following options: Erosion control, silviculture, range management, forest or range ecology, forest economics, forest administration,

forest survey, forest recreation, and forest land acquisition.

The salaries range from \$2,600 to \$6,400 a year, less a deduction of not to exceed 15 per cent as a measure of economy and a retirement deduction of 3 1-2 per cent.
