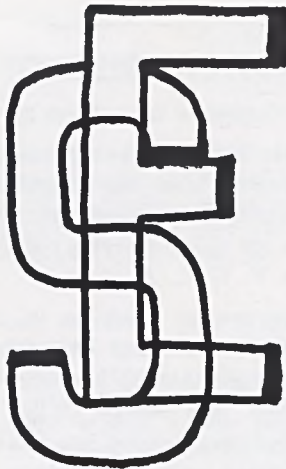


Southeastern District Column

Have your members memorized our new northeastern district motto yet? It is: "Let us be seen by our deeds."

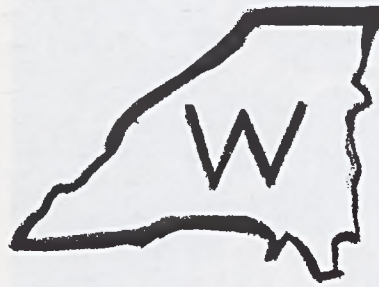
