The Braille Magazine Report was indeed impressive. There were 291 copies published at a cost of 80 cents each or \$938.00 for the year past; of this amount \$358.65 had been contributed by Federated Club Women of North Carolina. The postage for mailing these magazines is paid by the Government. Mrs. Merrick feels that the work and reports of no club is complete without a contribution each year to the Braille Magazine.

The report called attention to free eye tests available in the state, and we were advised to watch papers of notice of these in our community and take advantage cf the same.

The report also called these facts to our attention. A new school is in the making for White Blind people in Wilson, N. C. There is now a school for the Blind in Raleigh and a separate school for Deaf and Dumb at Morganton, while the state has only one Negro school for Deaf-Dumb and Blind combined. The questions we asked —Is this Justice? What can club women Do?
