State President Helps Integrate City Library.

On February 26, 1962 the segregation hinges on the doors of the main Public Library in Elizabeth City were exchanged for a set of new, bright, shiny integration hinges.

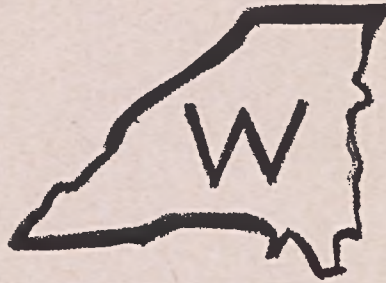
This new policy was inaugurated very quietly and without quarrelling, picketing, legal action or the threat of either. The Library Commission, after a series of conferences with three Negroes, officially voted to desegregate the main library down town. The three Negroes requesting desegregation were: Mrs. E. M. Spellman, Rev. J. R. R. McRay and Rev. Raymond E. Stephens.

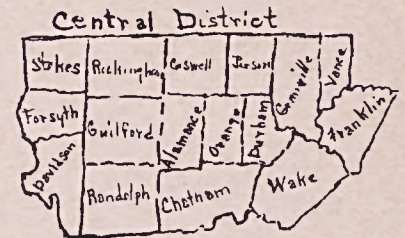
On April 14, at Lillington, N. C. this district held its Sixth Annual Convention. Attending and sharing in the program were:
