

Y.A. OF S.E. MEET

August 1, 1967

The Youth advisors of the Southeastern Association of Girls' Clubs met July 30, 1967 in room 1401 prior to the meeting of the Southeastern Youth July 31, 1967. As a result of the two meetings, we wish to submit the following recommendations:

1. A Youth Advisory Council be formed with a youth representative from each state.
2. The National Youth Advisor be informed one month prior to all state meetings.
3. The National, Regional and State Advisors be furnished a copy of the program, officers, and registered membership of each association (Southeastern) meeting.
4. All minutes be typewritten in triple copies, one copy to the National Advisor, one to the District Advisor and one copy to the State Advisor to be kept on permanent record.
5. A record book and/or files, ear-marked Youth be kept by

This is just to say **ALL COMMITTEE CHAIRMEN**, both Standing and Departments, are asked to begin your 1967-68 Convention Year Work as early as is convenient. Please do not wait until we are in Fayetteville on Convention date to begin your work.

Some of the reports of last years work were very good. Some could not attend and mailed them in. We thank you so much.

Correspondence is not the best procedure for committee work, but it is better than waiting until the day we begin our convention to start.

I recommend exchange of ideas by mail, since we are not in a position to pay travel expenses for meeting in person. **WE WILL** refund you for postage, phone calls and materials in reason needed to get the job done.

If you wish to add other persons to your committee, from any place, feel free to do so.

DEPARTMENT CHAIRMEN, I believe all our clubs will welcome ideas or materials from you that they can pass on to one another and to the community. It is our duty to promote, enhance and aid in self improvement of our women.

Don't forget the **JOURNAL** is at your service twice a year. You may contact me for addresses if needed.

The chairmen are the same except where a few persons resigned. We were all appointed or elected to serve for a two year term, remember.

the District Advisor from one year to the next to build a permanent progress record for history and reference purposes.

6. The officers of the Youth Division of the Association return to the next regional to guide the meeting and bring another delegate from the state clubs to participate and take her place.

7. Each state be financially responsible for getting the officers from its state to the Southeastern Convention.

8. Each state shall be responsible for getting its contest winners (Oratorical, Fashion and Talent) to the Southeastern Convention.

9. The Southeastern Association be responsible for getting its winner to the National Convention.

10. Each state will pay its dues of twenty-five (25) cents per member per year to the Southeastern and fifty cents (50c) each year to the National along with their State dues.

11. Each girls club report on the official form, the name of

the club, the Presidents' name, address, advisor's name and address, and the names of each member paying membership dues to the Southeastern Association and to the national.

12. That each state in the Southeastern Association sponsor a "Miss Federated Teenager" Contest to raise money for its treasurer; twenty-five per cent of its proceeds to the Youth Southeastern Treasure and twenty-five percent to the National Treasurer to help defray expense of prizes for the National and to aid the winners of the contest in the District.

13. Girls finishing high school and up to age twenty-five be organized from the state level to form Young Adult Clubs to build the bridge between the Youth and Adult Clubs.

14. To organize boys as associated to the girls operating under the same constitution and by-laws as the girls financially and otherwise.

Satisfying our wants and needs was the topic used by Dr. Moore. Our strongest need is to love and be loved. Communication is one of the best ways to show that you care. Another need and a desire is to do something well. A person will respond if he thinks he is doing well. People want to be involved in things, give them a chance by using them in the organization. Learn names of members and call them by their names. People like to hear their names. Learn what people react to and work on that. The next point Dr. Moore discussed was "tensions". To deal with them, talk it over, don't hold things in. Work off your angry spells, don't lock them up. Do something for somebody else. Make yourself available, be helpful and encouraging. To sum up the entire discussion: Learn to laugh — if you laugh quickly you are well adjusted, if you can't laugh, learn to deal with tensions when they come your way; remember, laughter is a good medicine.
