Must be Advertised.

The Sup rintend at of the Dead emp rium, Letter Rureau, with the approval of the Postmarier General, has prepared a e reular letter, which will be sent shortly to all postmasters, directing the enforcement of Section 590 of the Postal Laws and Regulations. This section makes it imperative upor pos mesters to advertise in a news paper or post a manuscript list of non-deliver d letters. It also requires the charge and collection of one cent in all cases when a letter has been published, whether the list has been published in newspaper. either grammtously or at one cent for each letter, or less sum, or whether the publication was merely by a writ ten list posted in some public place. In all cases the postmaster is directed to affix and cancel a one-cent "postage due" stamp as evidence of its delivery. In postoffices other than those of the free delivery class the "postage due" stamp should not be affixed until the letter is delivered. I his clause of the postal laws, it is said, has not hitherto been strictly enforced.
