TELEGRAPH TICKS.

THE LATEST WIRED NEWS BOILED DOWN.

The Revolver Work—A Record of suicides.

Indians attacked a party of prospectors near Tombstone, A. T., yesterday, killing two of the party.

A flow of gas producing a flame ten feet high has been struck at Seneca Falls, N. Y. in a well 1,450 feet deep.

Warren Terwilliger and a young son of Squirt Montgomery were seriously injured Monday night while coasting at Dalton, Pa.

John Rowles was convicted yesterday at Wichita, Kan., of illegally selling beer and sentenced to seven-year imprisonment.

Wool growers of Utah, representing a million sheep, met at Salt Lake yesterday to organize against any reduction of the wool duty.

At Mattawa, Ont., Monday Thomas Bounin, who was drunk, slapped Mrs. Cyrie Laroque in the face. She shot him, causing his death yesterday.

Charles Falls, wanted at water town, N. Y., for embezzling the funds of Lign-makers Union No. 120, was arrested yesterday at St. Paul, Minn.

John Cressler, twelve years old, jumped upon a passing freight train yesterday at Shippensburg, Pa., falling cutting his throat and jumping into a creek.

Frederick Anterrieth, of No 123 North Eleventh street, Philadelphia, a dealer in mineral water, drowned himself in his bath tub yesterday morning.

J. D. Barnes, a Chatham shoe dealer, shot Lewis Owens, one of the wealthiest citizens in that city, yesterday morning, and was cut by the latter. Owens' wounds are fatal.

The trial of Benj. E. Hopkins, assistant cashier of the Fidelity National Bank of Cincinnati, was resumed in that city yesterday before the United States District Court.

John Alexander, thirteen years old, was burned to death Monday night at Xenia, Ohio. A can of gasoline took fire from a lamp, filling his bedroom with flames, in which he perished.

Mr. W. H. Warner, gave a public banquet last night to the Rochester Chamber of Commerce, of which he is the president. President Cleveland and Governor Hill sent letters of regret.

Governor West sent his message to the Utah Legislature yesterday. He takes strong ground against polygamy and recommends the repeal of local laws conflicting with federal statutes.

The production of steel rails by Bessemer works in this country in 1887 was 2,049,638 gross tons, being 467,228 tons greater than in 1886. The works which closed down in December are still idle.

Daniel Wells, Jr., has just gained a verdict in the Wisconsin Supreme Court for \$181,640.63 and interest at seven per cent from July 12, 1863 against Pease & Co. The matter grew out of the celebrated attempt of McClellan to corner the lard market.

Mr. S. Witkowsky returned yesterday from New York, and reports that his son, Gerard Witkowsky, is rapidly recovering from the surgical operation recently performed upon him in that city. Gerard has the distinction of being the only person in the world who has survived an operation of the like character. Drs. Baruch and Lunda, assisted by five other physicians, had Gerard's case in hand, and they performed upon him an operation of laparotomy for perforation of the vermiform appendix. This appendix, by the way, is one whose use has never yet been ascertained by the doctors. The cause of trouble in Gerard's case was a raisin seed that had lodged in the appendix. Dr. Lunda says that this is the only successful operation of the kind that has been performed within the history of the world.
