When Rockingham won the State AAA football championship two weeks ago, it was the first time in 35 years that the town could claim such an honor. We make mention of the fact because Shorty Lawrence—brother of New Bern's former mayor, L. C. Lawrence—coached the 1924 that topped every other high school eleven in North Carolina.

Shorty, beloved and respected at State college, died last April in Raleigh. His 1924 ball club captured its State crown by defeating Shelby 7-0 at Chapel Hill. There were no classification among the teams at that time, so to win the championship a team had to be better than the entry of each of the other North Carolina schools, large or small.

This could well be one of the most exciting basketball seasons in

recent years at New Bern High. The Bruins seem to have the spunk to stay in a ball game, and are apt to pull some of their contests out of the fire. Even in the Raleigh game, where they weren't figured on for a real battle, they made a fight of it for three quarters.

Entertaining basketball isn't restricted to high school games, at least not here in New Bern. For example, the Midget League can be counted on for nip and tuck affairs throughout the season. Last year, 17 of the 30 regularly scheduled games played by the small fry were won by a margin of two points or less. Sports fans couldn't ask for basketball fare more pleasing and exciting than that.

We've got a tender spot in our heart for 79-year-old Branch Rickey as he works his heart out to make the Continental League a reality as the third major league. We remember how he used to give Southern ball players every consideration, and many of them became stars for him. Once, when we interviewed him, he said Dixie's athletes had plenty on the ball.
