QUESTION: Alfalfa weevils are ruining the first cutting of my hay. What can I do?

ANSWER: Treat with methoxychlor or malathion. Be sure to keep field checked. Even after present crop of weevils decreases, another one can appear.

QUESTION: Is there much profit in average yields of corn in North Carolina?

ANSWER: Not much, when corn sells for \$1 per bushel. The average corn yield in North Carolina last year was 43 bushels per acre. Production costs for an acre of corn generally are \$30 to \$40 an acre. This doesn't leave much profit.

QUESTION: Why isn't crotalaria now recommended as a soil conservation and improvement crop?

ANSWER: Because crotalaria seed are poisonous to poultry and livestock. The seed become mixed with feed as grain is harvested from fields in which crotalaria is growing.
