License Plates Change Made

Several changes have been made in the motor vehicles registration laws which went into effect with the beginning of the new year Monday.

Chief among them is the fact that the license plate now "goes with the owner" rather than with the car or vehicle.

This feature is explained in a pamphlet sent with the application forms to the more than a million motor vehicle owners in this state.

The certificate of title law has been strengthened with certain provisions relating to making liens against motor vehicles. Registration fees have been changed for trucks and trailers.

Quoting from the pamphlet: "Beginning with the 1962 registration year, your license plate is to be identified with you and nobody else. If the vehicle is sold or otherwise disposed of, be sure that you remove and retain the plate so it can no longer be transferred with the vehicle to the next owner. If your insurance continues in effect and you wish to transfer the plate to another vehicle, you may do so but if assignment to another vehicle is not made within 20 days or insurance is not to be continued in effect, the plate must be surrendered to the Department of Motor Vehicles.

"The plate removed from a disposed of vehicle may be transferred to another vehicle owned by you, provided the vehicle to which it

is being transferred is of like category as the vehicle from which it is being transferred."

The information continues: "If you dispose of a vehicle and the plate is not to be assigned within 20 days to another vehicle you are required by law to return the plate to the department. Should you later in the same license year acquire a vehicle to which transfer of the plate is permissible, you may apply to the department for its reinstatement and transfer to the newly acquired vehicle."

There are numerous other provisions concerning the surrender of the plate, redemption and refund.

Registration fees have been changed for trucks and trailers and these have been outlined in the pamphlet as well as the liability insurance requirements.

The sale of license plates at field office starts today, although sales have been underway for several days at the department's headquarters in Raleigh.
