jects of world-wide and com- munity interest. Chautauqua has its own hotels, cottages, lodging houses, class buildings, and athletic fields for physical education. Millions of dollars have gone into the project.

According to our Compton's Encyclopedia, the Institution was founded to provide training for Sunday school teachers. In 1874 John Heyl Vincent, editor of the Sunday School Journal and later a bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church, and Lewis Miller, a manufacturer of Akron, Ohio, organized a summer class which met at Fair Point on Lake Chautauqua.

The name of the meeting place was soon changed to Chau- tauqua. It was one of the first institutions to offer summer study. Interest was so great that by 1879 instruction was being given in foreign languages and education methods. Rapid expansion followed, with es- tablishment of a School of The- ology and a Chautauqua Univer- sity.
