New Bern's determined but inexperienced Bears must go into the campaign without benefit of any player who started all of last season's contests. This fact notwithstanding, the Bruins should be better ball handlers and they have a scoring punch that might be sufficient on numerous nights.

Defensively, the local lads are apt to have their troubles. If we had to take a guess, it would be our prediction that the Bears will score often and get scored on often. You'll see plenty of fast breaks before tournament time.

The Bruins are, with a few exceptions, young and small. Offsetting these liabilities to some extent is great desire, and willingness to learn. Coach Bob Lewis tells us that he has been impressed with these factors.

Something else that brightens the picture, as it would for any mentor, is the academic standing of the Bears as a whole. Ball games aren't won in the classroom, but an athlete whose marks present a problem isn't the most desirable man to rely on for continuous service.

One of the healthy aspects of modern scholastic sports is the emphasis on satisfactory grades. Certainly on the college level there are few grants in aid awaiting the star athlete who has shown little inclination for serious study.
