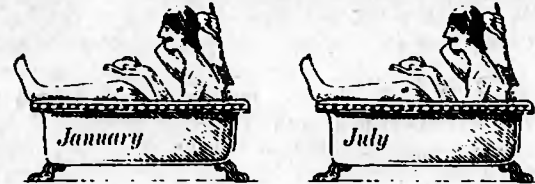
MR. WIZARD EXPLAINS WHY YOUR ELECTRIC BILL MIGHT BE HIGHER THIS TIME OF YEAR.
