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research and extension personnel, a graduate student and two members of a prominent nursery family.

Dr. R. Gordon Halfacre and Mr. David Bradshaw of the Department of Horticultural Science; Professor J. C. Wells of the Department Plant Pathology; of Professor Robert L. Robertson of the Department of Entomology; and Mr. J. Stewart Howard Mrs. Elizabeth and Freeman (his daughter) of Laurel Lake Gardens and Nursery, Salemburg. It would be difficult to get a more competent team to write about the selection of varieties, planting and care of camellias.

The bulletin is well organized and the format very attractive. These are some of the subjects discussed -- kinds of camellias, location and soil, method of planting, fertilization, pruning, watering and winter care, cold injury, propagation, "Gibbing" (including how to make your own gibbing solution), insects, diseases and varieties.

Proper planting of camellias is illustrated and explained in seven steps. Cleft grafting is also well illustrated and explained -- step by step. Some of the insects



covered are -- tea scale, camellia scale, peony scale, Florida wax scale and red spider mites. Control measures are recommended for each. Diseases covered are -leaf blotch and twig blight, scab, canker (dieback), flower blight, nematodes, yellow mottle leaf, root rot and leaf and bud galls. Control measures are given for each disease.

One fine and unusual feature of this publication is the attention given to varieties. Systematic descriptions of over 200 varieties are listed, including the hybrids.




