Cleaning **Hints For** Fireplace Soot

If your fireplace has become stained with smoke and soot over the winter, you can remove these stains with simple cleaning methods.

First, says Dr. Glenda Herman, extension housing specialist at North Carolina State University, scrub the facing with strong soap and water.

For brick or roughtextured areas, you may need to use a stiff brush. then rinse thoroughly th clear water.

'You may need to use a mild acid bleach, such as vinegar or acetic acid," the specialist says. "Again, apply with a brush and rinse with water.'

For stubborn stains, scrub with a hydrochloric acid and water solution. T aid and water solution. To prepare it, mix one part acid to ten parts water. Rinse off with water immediately will also remove construction tains from mortar, the ecialist says.
