National School Lunch and Breakfast Program

The New Bern-Craven County Board of Education recently announced its policy for free and reduced meals for the children served under the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs.

Each school and the central office has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown below are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Application forms are being sent home in a letter to parents and copies are also available at the office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

A statement of family income size including household member names, social security numbers of all adults or an indication that a household member does not have one, is required, plus a signed certification by the parent, guardian, or other adult household member that the information provided is correct.

An application which does not contain the above complete information cannot be approved. Parents may request assistance from the school official in filling out the form.

Under the provisions of the policy, the school principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the decision of the determining official, he or she may wish to discuss it with the official on an informal basis. If the parent wishes to make a formal appeal, he or she may contact Mrs. Martha F. Smith, New Bern-Craven County Board of Education, P. O. Box 969, New Bern, N.C. in writing or by telephone (919)638-2133, for a hearing to appeal the decision.

Families are required to report income increases by more than \$50 per month (or \$600 per year) or when their household size decreases. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for additional benefits, if the family income falls at or below the levels shown.

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for program benefits. Parents should inform the school official if they have foster children in the household.

In the operation of child feeding programs, all children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. No child is discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap.

School officials have adopted the following family size and income standards for determining eligibility:
