Seal Off Tooth Decay

The state's chief dental health official, Dr. George G. Dudney, is urging dentists across North Carolina to use plastic dental sealants to protect the chewing surfaces of

children's teeth from decay.

Children have an average of nearly 10 decayed, extracted or filled teeth by the time they reach age 16. Studies now show that sealants can reduce

this dental decay by 65 percent or more. They are safe, effective, and painless.

Dudney pointed out that using these dental sealants now is less expensive than

paying later for costly dental work caused by decay. They are expected to last the same length of time as routine (silver) fillings, about seven years.
