Hunt Met With Business, Education and Government Leaders

Gov. Jim Hunt met with business, education and government leaders on June 25 to discuss recommendations from the final report of the N.C. Assembly on Women and the Economy.

The meeting took place at 11 a.m. on June 25 in the Old House Chambers in the State Capitol. About 75 representatives from private industry, education and local government were expected to attend the meeting.

"At the Governor's Conference on Women and the Economy, I promised to discuss these important recommendations with our state's leaders," Hunt said. "I look forward to meeting and talking about the kinds of things we can do to improve the relationship of women and their families to the economy."

The final report on women and the economy was presented to the governor in May.

It contains more than 100 recommendations from the N.C. Assembly on Women and the Economy, a group of 150 North Carolina women and men who studied the issues. The recommendations were presented to and refined by participants of the Governor's Conference on Women and the Economy, held last fall.

"I am proud of what we have done in this state to improve our economy," Hunt said. "These recommendations, if implemented, will make our economy even more successful and will benefit all citizens of our state."

Pulp And Paper Scholarship Winner

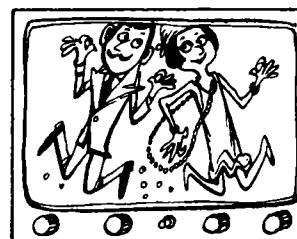
