Certificates were presented to the youngsters who read 10 or more books during July. In addition to the winners of the game they were as follows:



Social Security

Some changes must be reported by all getting Social Security benefits. These include any change of mailing address, earnings of more than the annual exempt amount, travel or employment outside of the United States, and imprisonment for committing a

felony.

Depending on their circumstances, other beneficiaries must report a marriage, divorce, or annulment; the adoption of a child or the fact that a child has left the care of a parent; any change in school attendance for a student 18-19; or the death of a person who is receiving benefits.

People needing help or who want more information about reporting a change should contact any Social Security office.
