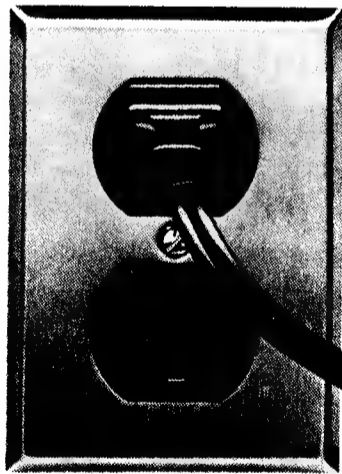
Chicken Fry
