Taxes Paid By CT&T Reflect Large Investment

Carolina Telephone's 1984 Vanceboro property tax payment here amounted to \$5,527.11.

W.C. Thomas, Carolina Telephone's district commercial manager in New Bern, said that the company's total tax payment within Craven county, including all town and y taxes, is \$415,129.50.

County and municipal taxes

paid by the company in its 50county operating area totaled \$7 million.

"The taxes reflect Carolina Telephone's extensive investment in facilities and equipment to provide telephone service to more than telephone users by the 615,000 customers in eastern North Carolina," said Thomas. Carolina Telephone's total

tax bill for 1984, including all our service area to provide

state and federal taxes, is modern, reliable telephone expected to come to approximately \$83 million.

This figure does not include more than \$10 million in three percent federal excise tax payments that were billed to company.

"Carolina Telephone has more than \$1 billion invested in

"In recent years, our

construction programs have been costing us in excess of

\$90 million dollars annually. Of this \$90 million spent each year, about half goes to maintain and replace existing equipment. The remaining dollars are being used to modernize, upgrade, and in some cases, expand our facilities."
