HISTORICAL MARKER IN PLACE

"SAINT MARY'S

Episcopal school for girls, established 1842 by Rev. Aldert Smedes on site of an earlier school for boys which opened 1834."

Thus reads the marker which the North Carolina Historical Society has placed in front of Saint Mary's summer house.

The difficulties in securing the marker included a run-in with priorities and a misprint in the wording. Finally, last week, the marker was set in place, corrected.

A great honor is attached to the granting of an historical marker by the Society, for the site must be one which really helped make the history of North Carolina, and all information about the place must be factual.

Mrs. Cruikshank, as a member of the Society and Head of the school, and all who are connected with Saint Mary's are extremely pleased that the Society found the school worthy of this recognition.
