Saint Mary's started its current drive for the purchase of war bonds and stamps January 16. This campaign will last through the middle of February. The present goal is \$1,100, or the bond price of one jeep. Sales are being made every Tuesday and Friday afternoon by members of the circulation staff of the Belles. If every member of a hall buys at least two stamps a week, that hall will be awarded the Treasury Department Minute Man. If 90 per cent of the school can keep up this record, Saint Mary's will receive a Treasury Citation. There will be hall competition, but individual records will also be kept.

The co-chairmen of this Bond Drive are Anna Margaret and Lillian Love who are working in collaboration with the circulation staff of the Belles under Betsy Durham. Members of this staff are selling stamps on their own halls twice a week. War Fund Collection

The first collection of money pledged for the United War Fund is scheduled for Tuesday, January 23, by a representative from each hall who will be responsible for collecting the money, according to Jane Peete and Martha Parker, who are in charge of the drive.
