Pittsburgh Symphony Gives Delightful Performance

Reiner Changes Program At Audience's Request

The Pittsburgh Symphony Orhestra, under the direction of Fritz Reiner, presented a very good concert at the Raleigh Memorial Auditorium on Tuesday evening, November 27, at 8:00 p.m.

THE PROGRAM

The orchestra opened the program with The Romas Carnival Overture, Op. 9, by Hector Berlioz based on themes from the opera, Benvenuto Cellini. Next was Symphony No. 4 in F Minor, Op. 36, by Peter Ilvitch Tschaikowsky. Tschaikowsky himself places this above his Fifth Symphony and his Pathetique.

The last half of the program was changed to include requests by the Raleigh Civic Music Association. The first selection was Moldau by Smetana. This was followed by four well known Hungarian Dances by Brahms, Nos. 5, 6, 7, and 21. As a concluding number the orchestra played the Carousel Waltz by Rogers, the composer of the musical score of Oklahoma.

DR. REINER

Dr. Reiner was born in Budapest, Hungary. He attended the Univer-Professorship of Music. The great success of this first assignment led to his conductive the Taileach Nato his conducting the Laibach National Pera in 1910. In 1911, he conducted the People's Opera in Budapest. In 1914 he received the most covered position of European most coveted position of European musicians, that of director of the Dresden Royal Opera. RESIGNS AS PRESIDENT

Her Resignation Will Take Effect In June, 1946

The resignation of Mrs. Ernest Cruikshank as president of Saint Mary's was announced at the annual meeting of the board of trustees. This resignation will be effective

Mrs. Cruikshank has been president of Saint Mary's for the past 14 years. The Board expressed regret that Mrs. Cruikshank was terminating her connection with the school and appreciation for her successful term as president.

It was pointed out that under Mrs. Cruikshank's leadership, the "exceptionally high academic standards of Saint Mary's School and Junior College have been maintained, that the student enrollment has been at maximum capacity for the past nine years, and that an extensive program of repairs and modernization of the buildings and equipment have been carried out."

Dr. T. Z. Koo Will Speak To Students and Faculty

Dr. T. Z. Koo, famous Chinese and world citizen, will speak to the students and faculty members of Saint Mary's School and Junior College on Monday morning, December 3. Dr. Koo is a very interesting person, and he will speak on the Orient.

Dr. Koo has returned to the United States after almost three years under the watchful eyes of the Japanese. He was in Hong Kong on December 17, 1941, and he and his wife nearly starved for three months before catching the boat for Shanghai. In Shanghai he served as lay-minister of the Community Church and as superintendent of a maternity hospital. He left Shanghai in September, 1944, and reached Chungking on December 31, 1944. He was a delegate of the Chinese government to the San Francisco Conference in April, 1945, and he will remain here for several months, traveling and speaking as a representative of the World Student Christian Federation.
