Anton Dolin Dances With Markova As Her Partner

Alicia Markova, the "greatest ballerina in history," her partner, Anton Dolin, and their ensemble including Ana Ricardo, Albia Kavan, Joan Engel, Fay Rachel, Jack Gansert, Marie Taglioni, Lucille Grahn, Carlotta Grisi, and Fanny Cerito gave a brilliant performance at the Raleigh, Momorial, Anditorium, on Raleigh Memorial Auditorium on Monday evening, November 12, at

Miss Markova, who was born in London, studied under Serge Diag-hilev. A company was formed under his direction and Miss Markova was to have her first prima ballerina role. Diaghilev died shortly afterwards and the company was dissolved. Difficult years followed during which Miss Markova and Mr. Dolin toured the British Isles with their own group. This famous dancer was the first non-Russian to be accepted in a Russian ballet as the prima ballerina. In 1938 she joined the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo. She made her brilliant debut in New York in Giselle.

Mr. Dolin, born in Sussex, England, was also taught by Diaghilev and became the only non-Russian Premier Danseur in Diaghilev's
