

"Without You" Is New Hit of The Week

"I'm so lonely and blue, when I'm without You,
I don't know what I'd do, sweetheart, without You."

These words start a wonderful new record which has everything: unforgettable words, nostalgic melody, and an inimitable arrangement by Frankie Carle. It's "Without You" on Columbia records.

Frank Sinatra has hit the top again with "I Guess I'll Get the Papers and Go Home." His recording of this new release is by far the best.

For all the Tex Beneke fans there is "I Know" on Victor records. This one isn't particularly recent, but as long as Tex Beneke arranged it, it remains high on the list of favorites.

"Five O'Clock Shadow," as done by Eliot Lawrence, isn't boogie but it's fast and catchy and coming to the top. Also on this order is Skitch Henderson's recording of "Why Does It Get So Late So Early?" This one really expresses the feelings at school, doesn't it?

Dinah Shore's newest release is "You Keep Coming Back Like a Song." It's romantic and tuneful.

If you like the music of Victor Herbert, then the album put out by Capitol records is for you. It includes "When You're Away," "Kiss Me Again," and "Italian Street Song," among many others. The vocals are beautifully performed by Lois Butler, accompanied by Paul Weston and his Orchestra.

Harry James has two songs recorded that are hits already and are getting even more popular each day. They are "I'd Be Lost Without You" and "And Then It's Heaven." As always David Rose manages to pull at your heartstrings with his beautiful music. Chief among these heartbreakers is "Nostalgia." It really carries you back to past days and brings those memories close.

Finally, there is a new album, by Arturo Rodzinski and the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra, of that ever popular Tchaikovsky work, "The Nutcracker Suite," op. 71 A. This is superior music and exceptionally well conducted.

State Art Gallery Shows Local Work

The new exhibition of paintings and drawings at the state art gallery is the work of Arthur Deshaies, Raleigh commercial artist, who has studied, painted, and exhibited in many parts of the world.

Born in Providence, Rhode Island, he studied at Cooper Union Art School and Art Students League, both in New York, and at Sydney Technical Art School in Sydney, New South Wales, Australia. Australia, along with a number of the war zones during the past war, has thus been the center of much of Mr. Deshaies' painting and drawing.

The subjects of the current exhibition are not widely appealing, although some are familiar scenes from around Raleigh; but the color, texture, and frames of the paintings make up for the lack of appealing subject matter.

Among the paintings there are two small oils portraying distorted figures. The figures, though they show much feeling, are not generally pleasing; but the excellent color and texture and the well-chosen frames raise the paintings to a high level of excellence. Mr. Deshaies is, as the Sydney Daily Mirror says, "a true painter with sole concern for the beauty of paint as paint."

There are two drawings, "Drawing of Girl" and "Study," done in oil and ink, whose beauty of line is particularly pleasing.

Mr. Deshaies' exhibition may not be the most universal in appeal, but it is certainly worth seeing, both for the exquisite colors used and for the well-chosen frames.
