Western Sectors Of Berlin Conduct Elections; Communists Fear Decline

Elections are to be held in the western sectors of Berlin on Sunday. The authorities have forbidden the voting in the Soviet sector and it is rumored that the Communists fear a sharp drop in their strength in this election. Attendance to a "rally" was called for in the Soviet sector to "take decisive measures for the protection of a united Berlin." Col. Frank L. Howley, U. S. commandant in Berlin, has warned the Communists against any violence or attempt at revolution.

The North Carolina Tar Heels defeated the Virginia Cavaliers at Charlottesville, Va., this weekend. It was a great game for Carolina's Charlie (Choo Choo) Justice; he made the outstanding touchdown of the game by making an 80-yard dash to the goal line. The final score was 34-12. After this galloping victory over

Virginia, the victors accepted an invitation to meet the Oklahoma Sooners at the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans on New Year's Day. The Tar Heels voted unanimously to play in the Sugar Bowl classic. "That was what we wanted all the time, the Sugar Bowl bid," admitted Carolina Coach Carl Snavely.

The entire nation was harassed by floods and snow this week-end. Georgia, Alabama, and Tennessee had flooded areas. Swollen rivers and streams put hundreds out of their homes. In Macon, Ga., the waters covered the rooftops of many homes. The damage to crops and property is estimated at thousands of dollars.

New York, Pennsylvania, Idaho, Montana, and several mid-western states had snow. In Durango, Colorado, the thermometer registered six degrees.

Underclassmen Will Have Honor Society

Beacon Has Twofold Purpose, To Create Interest and Spirit

Saint Mary's Honor Council has granted permission to the high school students to have an honor society, the Beacon. This will not be a secret organization. The idea originated with the high school students who put in a petition to the Honor Council. Some of the girls who put in the petition were Susannah Dell, Betty Ann Williamson, Pat George, Mary Alice Williams, Becky Wall, and Betty Cheek. This petition was approved both by the Honor Council and by Dr. Stone. The main purposes of the Beacon are to increase school spirit and to develop interest in extra-curricular activities.

NECESSARY QUALIFICATIONS

Members will be chosen at the end of the first quarter. In order to qualify a student must (1) have an average of C or above in her academic work, (2) participate actively in at least two extracurricular activities, (3) be recommended by the leaders of these activities, (4) be recommended by her hall counselors or by the day student president in the eases of day students, (5) be recommended by her teachers, (6) have school spirit, and (7) show a willingness to abide by the rules of the school. The committee which will choose the members has not yet been definitely appointed. It will be composed of high school teachers, student leaders, and others who come in close contact with high school students.

Ann Moore, vice-president of the student body, will be in charge of the organizational meeting. At this meeting the purpose of the society will be further explained. Officers will be elected and plans for the future will be made.

Students Will Present Monologues And Drama
